SUBJECT

: **Reimbursement of Radionuclides and High Energy Radiation and Electrons used in Radiation Therapy as Drugs and Medicines**

Pursuant to PhilHealth Board Resolution No. 510, s. of 2002, the Corporation approves the reimbursement of radio-nuclides and high-energy radiation and electrons used in radiation therapy as drugs and medicines.

Radiotherapy is still included in the compensable list of surgeries and procedures enumerated in the Relative Value Scale 2001. As such, reimbursements for operating room (OR) fees are allowed. It is still classified a catastrophic case with corresponding reimbursement limits prescribed in the Benefit Schedule. The 'single period of confinement in 90 days rule' applies, which expressly provides a maximum cumulative benefit limit for admissions of a similar nature made within 90 days.

Therefore, examples for the reimbursement of radiation therapy are as follows:

Example no. 1: External Beam Cobalt treatment in a tertiary hospital
